- Our next big event will be the Craft Fair on November 1st. Volunteers are still needed for raffle ticket sales and the event itself.
- DPW has determined that we don't need a new fire panel based on the review by JCS. I explained
 the situation again, and asked the vendor to confirm that the panel cannot work with any new
 devices installed. I don't believe my request is unreasonable to address the trouble alarms that occur
 and I'm open to other solutions if the info. I received is not correct.
- The Fire suppression system over the range will be replaced, I'm still waiting for the repairs to be scheduled.
- Toured Master's Manna and met with their Executive Director, looking forward to working with them for our members.
- Attended the Wallingford Community Resource Alliance and learned more about other local organizations in town.
- Reviewing Employee and HR policies for 2026.
- Working with Erin to resolve some complaints and issues regarding our Bingo group.
- The Travel Committee offer has received a great response with over a dozen participants so far. Should be a very dynamic group with lots of good ideas.
- Our insurance company has recommended that we conduct background/sex offender registry checks
 on all volunteers and staff every 3 years to reduce the risk of elder abuse occurring while members
 are using our services. This seems to be a standard that they ask of their insured clients(Mostly Adult
 Day centers). I will implement that starting next month on a rolling basis.

- Held a joint staff meeting here with SCOW to share information and talk about ways we can collaborate more together.
- Awaiting input from the Town Risk Manager on outside group use of the WSC.

Kay Page has been a proud member of our senior center since 2016. When she retired, she took up quilting for the first time and found that she really loved to sew. It quickly turned into a passion and a purpose when she joined the "Quilting Club". They meet every Tuesday and are a tight knit group! Their time is sacred and everyone commits to not making appointments or other obligations that interrupt their time. Kay shared with me that she now sews 3-6 hours a day. She loves the colors, the patterns and creativity she uses to bring each piece to life. Every year, the groups works tirelessly on small lap quilts, bibs, coasters, dolls, placemats and eye glass cases. They sell their works of art at the annual holiday fair in November to support senior center programming and create a beautiful display of patriotic quilts for several other events. Social Service Monthly Report

Month: September 2025

Social Service Coordinator completed 549 units during the month of September.

The Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program was a great success! All the ecards that were received from the program, were distributed to Wallingford residents who were eligible. The community was delighted to have the experience to shop and receive quality, local, farm fresh items for free. The feedback was all very positive. All the surveys that were received had excelled ratings. Final paperwork was completed and sent to the state of Ct. I am very hopeful that this program will return again next year so the Wallingford Senior Center (WSC) may again be a distribution site for the community.

In addition to the Senior Farmers Market program (SFMP), The Connecticut Food Share mobile pantry continues to come twice a month to offer fresh food and pantry items to the Wallingford residents. The coordinator of Ct Food Share informed me that the amount of people served at our location has doubled from their previous location. A greater increase is also seen during the holidays and the warmer months. They are very grateful to have us as a partner to help individuals with food insecurity. People continue to express how grateful they are for having the Ct Food Share Mobile Pantry so close to their home. New attendees are requesting information monthly. It is truly helping them every month. We are honored to partner with Ct Food Share and will continue to provide a safe and convenient location for them and the community.

I continue to be involved in the Wallingford Works for Housing (WWFH), with Ben Fink from SCRCOG and other community leaders, service providers, relaters, town employees, and retirees. Our goal is to raise community awareness and support for expanded housing options. We want as many people as possible to be informed and involved. There are challenges wherever you are on your housing journey and all ages are affected. Together, we are building relationships with our neighbors, our town officials, and those in other towns as we work toward common goals. Our goal is housing for all, economic growth, and a healthy future for Wallingford. During the month of September, I presented with Mary Mushinski, State Rep, and Kristen Butts realtor at the YMCA Over 55 Community. About 25 attended and several attendees asked many questions about new housing development and shared their personal struggles and concerns.

On September 15th, I presented a power point presentation at the Wallingford Public Library on *New to Medicare Enrollment*. The presentation offered the community insights on Medicare and the different programs that are available, as well as, informing the community information on Wallingford Senior Center's social service offerings. Several attendees from the presentation afterwards sought services and then became members to the center.

Weekly support groups held at the WSC continue to assist people who are grieving, feel alone, are overwhelmed by their stress and anxiety. Having a qualified license therapist to help facilitate the support group adds a therapeutic need for the participants who have depression and anxiety disorders require. Offering them professional tools and guidance for them to adopt has become crucial to the uniqueness and success of our support group setting. This has set us apart from most other support groups that are offered in other environments. Most Medicare plans do not cover mental health, leaving people alone and suffering because they cannot afford private care. We have been successful in creating a safe place for them to express their emotions and needs. Each month, community residents are calling requesting to join the support group. The ARPA Grant money has ended and new ideas are being discussed with our new Executive Director on creative ways to keep the funding for mental wellness programs active at the WSC. Ending the current support group due to funding would

be a huge loss to the participants and the quality of care that the WSC is known for. The group is also learning how to improve their inner language on how they define themselves. Using less blame and negative statements and keeping the thoughts in the present time instead of the future helps them to reduce their anxiety and stress. During the current time we live in, the stress seen amongst our senior population has grown. People are afraid and expressing fear regarding their livelihood, medical needs and their living insecurity. The support group offers them a place to express their concerns and find ways to help them feel more comfortable in their environment. The development of trust and friendship among the attendees continues to be appreciated. They are welcoming to all new participants joining the support group, and each new person has expressed gratitude for the warm welcoming. The support groups meet every Tuesday from 2pm-3:30pm Co Facilitated by Jackie McNamee LFP and Joann Hummel SSC.

The month of September, resources that were offered to the community are as follow: Counseling on Medicare and Insurance Plans; SS Disability; Housing; Assisting in Food Insecurities and completing SNAP applications; Ct Food Share Mobile Pantry; Senior Farmers Market Program; Medicare Savings Program applications and DSS redeterminations assistance; DMV assistance; Cancer patient advocacy and Counseling; Grief counseling; Computer assistance; Review mail and assessing for scams; Locating community transportation companies; Assistance in securing Home Health Care and Senior Living; Co -facilitating weekly Support Groups.
